KEYNOTE ADDRESS: PSYCHOSOCIAL ASPECTS OF CANCER CARE FOR OLDER ADULTS

Fay Strohschein, RN, PhD (c) is a PhD candidate in nursing at McGill University, studying treatment decision making from the perspective of older adults with cancer. In 2015, she co-founded the Oncology and Aging Special Interest Group within the Canadian Association of Nurses in Oncology. She has held fellowships with the CIHR-funded Psychosocial Oncology Research Training Program and the Quebec Network for Research on Aging.

KEYNOTE ADDRESS: BUILDING A GERIATRIC ONCOLOGY PROGRAM: LESSONS LEARNED

Dr. Shabbir M.H. Alibhai, MD MSc FRCPC is a Professor in the Department of Medicine at the University of Toronto. He is a staff physician in General Internal Medicine and Geriatrics at Mount Sinai Hospital, a senior scientist at the Toronto General Research Institute and the Toronto Rehabilitation Institute, and a prior Research Scientist of the Canadian Cancer Society.

Dr. Ashley Bhullar, MD graduated from the Max Rady College of Medicine in 2015. She went on to complete the Family Medicine Integrated Care of the Elderly residency program at the University of Manitoba in 2018.

Heather Purvis, BN MSc graduated both from Science and Nursing at the University of Manitoba, and received her M.Sc. in Health Studies & Gerontology from the University of Waterloo in 2011. She is currently working as the Patient Representative at CancerCare Manitoba

COGNITION, IT'S ALL THAT REALLY MATTERS

Dr. Barry Campbell MD, FRCPC is a past director of a memory assessment clinic in Winnipeg with a special interest in dementia, delirium and neuropsychiatric disorders. He works with the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority, the Prairie Mountain Regional Health Authority and is an Associate Professor with the University of Manitoba. He is a past Board President of the Alzheimer Society of Manitoba.

THE IMPACT OF FRAILTY AND DELIRIUM IN THE SURGICAL PATIENT

Dr. Rakesh Arora MD PhD FRCSC is a professor in Surgery, Anesthesia and Physiology & Pathophysiology at the University of Manitoba and was appointed to Section Head of Cardiac Surgery for the WRHA and University of Manitoba since 2017. He pioneered a national society, The CANadian CARdiovascular critical care (CANCARE) Society (www.cancaresociety.com) that aims to advance the care of critically-ill cardiovascular patients using interdisciplinary expertise in a cooperative model.

IMMUNOTHERAPY IN OLDER PATIENTS

Dr. Vamsee Torri, MD, FACP FRCPC completed his residency in Internal Medicine, and fellowship in Hematology and Oncology at Columbia University affiliated St. Luke's-Roosevelt Hospital, New York. Subsequently, he worked as a medical oncologist at Saskatchewan Cancer Agency for five years before moving to CancerCare Manitoba. He directs the second-year undergraduate medical school "Principles of Oncology" course at the University of Manitoba.

CLINICAL CASES IN SYMPTOM MANAGEMENT AND DEPRESCRIBING

Dr. Elizabeth Rhynold, MD FRCPC completed her internal medicine residency at the University of Saskatchewan and a geriatric medicine fellowship at University of British Columbia. She relocated to Virden Manitoba in October 2016 and is now doing comprehensive geriatric assessments throughout Prairie Mountain Health and collaborating with local providers who are working with frail elderly.

Morgan Stirling, M.Sc is Projects and Evaluation Coordinator in the Underserved Populations Program at CancerCare Manitoba.
